CONTEXT

Biographical/Administrative History: Francis William Newman was born in London and educated at Worcester College, Oxford, graduating with a double first in 1826. As a young man he travelled in the Middle East before settling to an academic career. After holding positions in Bristol and Manchester, he became Professor of Latin at University College London in 1846, retaining the post until 1862. Newman also wrote widely on classical and religious topics and was a staunch supporter of women's rights and women's education. He returned to south-west England in 1866 and continued to write extensively while living in retirement at Weston-super-Mare. Unlike his elder brother, John Henry Newman (who converted to Roman Catholicism and became a cardinal), Francis Newman came to be sceptical of religious teaching, rejecting biblical authority and Christian dogma, but still considered himself to be a Christian.

CONTENT

Scope and Content: 32 letters addressed to Newman's nephew John Rickards Mozley; 1 letter addressed to Newman's sister Jemima Mozley; and 1 letter addressed to J R Mozley's father-in-law Bonamy Price. Topics covered include: domestic and family affairs; Newman's brother John Henry Newman (Cardinal Newman); education (including Augustus De Morgan and University College London); New Testament criticism; religion and morality; classical literature; mathematics; wealth; current affairs (including Irish Home Rule and the American Civil War); W E Gladstone; and John Ruskin. All items are autograph, with signatures.

AL342/1 Letter from Newman to John Rickards Mozley

1864 February 6

Written from 10 Circus Road, N.W. Congratulating him on his prize winning essay.

AL342/2 Letter from Newman to Jemima Mozley

1865 February 3

Written from 10 Circus Road, N.W. Mentions Mrs. Griffiths caring for Charles Robert Newman and about ointment for his legs. Family news about the cold weather and health problems. News from American newspapers about emancipation in Missouri and Tennessee, the celebration of the anniversary in, the freeing of the wives and children of "coloured" soldiers from loyal states and technical difficulties in Kentucky.

AL342/3 Letter from Newman to John Rickards Mozley

1866 November 20

Written from Dover Place, Clifton. Encouraging Rickards to ask for details about the vacant chair of Logic and Metaphysics at University College London and giving advice about applying and testimonials. His opinions about the various candidates (James Martineau, Alexander Bain) and the procedures.

1867

Written from Dover Place, Clifton. Apologies for neglecting to comment on Rickards' proposed marriage. More about the University College London professorship.

1872

November 5

Written from Weston- super- Mare. Congratulations on the new baby, hope Edith is well.

1876 August 7

Acknowledgement of letter from Rickards on the death of Newman's (first) wife [10 July 1876].

1877 July 30

Written from Weston-super-Mare. Asks about a translation of Vergil and asks for Rickards' opinion. Expands about translations.

AL342/8 Letter from Newman to John Rickards Mozley

1877 August 23

Written from Weston-super-Mare. [Sheets 1-4 have been labelled AL342/8 (i), sheets 5-8 AL342/8 (ii) and sheets 9-12 AL3428 (iii). They all have the same date and are part of one long letter.

- (i) Newman says there are several excellent treatises which deal well with the overwhelming evidence against the narrative books of the New Testament. He describes his own discontent with the moral precepts ascribed to Jesus and he considers the accounts of Paul (and Peter) superior. He thinks that the gospels, if made sacred, are mischievous and a gross misrepresentation. Newman does not accept the denunciation of the government of Judea (the Scribes and the Pharisees) and says our English institutions are more unjust than theirs were.
- (ii) Newman says that reporting Jesus as denouncing a wicked and adulterous generation at the same time as declaring that he is meek and lowly of heart is to confuse credulity with truth. He refers to his tract James and Paul (1869) in which he sets out a theory of the corruption of Christianity after the deaths of Paul and Peter and which persists in our ideas about ordination and the power which it is said to

bestow on ordinary men. He cites his brother [John Henry Newman] as saying "This is either a very momentous truth or it is a frightful blasphemy."

(iii) Defends rulers of Judea: they were no worse than any other rulers, and Jesus knew nothing of Roman, Macedonian, Persian or Assyrian rule. Then he takes issue with the account in Luke xi,37 of the dinner with the Pharisee.

Newman believes Jesus to have been only a frail man and therefore rejects the accounts of him in the 4th gospel.

Questions the stories of the resurrection and points to inconsistencies in the accounts. Insists that Paul did not believe it.

AL342/9 Letter from Newman to John Rickards Mozley

1877 September 10

Written from Weston-super-Mare. [Sheets 1-4 have been labelled AL342/9 (i) and sheets 5-8 AL342/9 (ii). They have the same date and are part of one long letter.]

- (i) Explains that the previous letter was in response to JRM's view of the "violent and fierce outburst in Matthew xxiii." His own rejection of the authoritative claims of or for Jesus has taken him 40 to 46 years to arrive at. Newman complains that Christianity deplorably confounds religion with history. His preface to The Hebrew Monarchy explains his attitude to miracles. He agrees with Paley and Butler that there is no adequate testimony for miracles from anonymous persons at a date unknown.
- (ii) Cites James Martineau: the fourth gospel is a romantic invention of the second century, yet spiritually true. Newman wants an expurgated gospel: a true history.

He cannot explain the judgements of Peter and Paul about Jesus... but he, Newman has no trustworthy history. Paul showed no knowledge at all of the human Jesus, nor any care to know. Orthodox churchman are in a dilemma about Jesus, either he was the Messiah and superhuman or he was vainly and despicably giving himself airs of Divine authority. The disciples did not claim to judge human hearts or to know all about God; they disciples their master, he was young and

inexperienced, they were humble and became riper by experience.

AL342/10 Letter from Newman to John Rickards Mozley

1880 February 24

Written from Weston-super-Mare.

Writes about a coupling of his name with that of Feuerbach, which he refuted, by the British Quarterly (about 25 years ago.) Newman mentions his book on the Soul, and also a Miss Cobbe who has written to him.

Jane Rickards has written to him about learning German. Rickard's children enjoy Scott's novels. Mentions author George Macdonald.

AL342/11 Letter from Newman to John Rickards Mozley

1881 August 24

Written from Weston-super-Mare. Says he is always welcome to visit Gloucester. Talks of visits from family members. Talks about his wife's health and treatment she may have.

AL342/12 Letter from Newman to Bonawry Price

Undated

No address. In reply to a letter asking a problem with his hand, a half paralysis, which is now recovered but may recur without care and rest.

AL342/13 Letter from Newman to John Rickards Mozley

1883 January 8

From Weston-super-Mare. Thanks for the Christmas card. News about family and health. Critical remarks about imperialism. And government.

AL342/14 Letter from Newman to John Rickards Mozley

1884 July 10

From Weston-super-Mare. Apologises for forgetting to acknowledge the Christmas card. Sends JRM some of his notes on Aeschylus. Has received a copy of his treatise "Christianity in the Cradle." He is still at work on his Latin version of Robinson Crusoe.

AL342/15 Letter from Newman to John Rickards Mozley

1885 December 28

From Weston-super-Mare. [Sheets 1-4 have been labelled AL342/15(i) and sheets 5-8 AL342(ii). They are both part of one long letter with the same date.]

AL342/16 Letter from Newman to John Rickards Mozley

1886 April 1

From Weston-super-Mare. Criticism of Mr. Ruskin's views about interest on money and his confusing it with usury. Talks about his own views and writings on the subject. English views on political economy, William Ellis and University College London.

AL342/17 Letter from Newman to John Rickards Mozley

1886 September 5

From Carnarvon.

[Sheets 1-4 have been labelled AL342/17 (i) another sheet is labelled AL342/17 (ii) and another AL342/17 (iii.) All are assumed to be written on the same date.] AL342/17 (i) visits by family members to north Wales and Snowdon and how much he, Newman enjoys visiting Wales. Family news and concerns.

AL342/17 (ii) a quotation from Hebrew Theism, p.46. AL342/17 (iii) a page in Greek, a retranslation by F.W.N.

AL342/18 Letter from Newman to John Rickards Mozley

1886 September 7

From Carnarvon. Defends the consistency of his religious views, refers to his works on Soul and Theism. Criticism of Gladstone over Home Rule. Ideas about parliamentary reform and Irish independence.

AL342/19 Letter from Newman to John Rickards Mozley

1886 December 15

Protests that he does not press his religious convictions on anyone else. Apologises for the pamphlet he sent, but he was reacting to being labelled an agnostic and a defender of positivism.

AL342/20 Letter from Newman to John Rickards Mozley

1888 August 18

From Bournemouth. Thanks him for sending an article on BP. Apologises [again] for his small writing and says that he also writes very slowly.

1888 December 19

From Weston-super-Mare. Defends himself against the views of Jesus which John Rickard attributes to him.

1890 September 28

The publishers want him to write a little book on "the late Cardinal." He finds this very difficult.

1890 October 5

Inveighs against his brother's Romanism and opposition to Protestantism and the reformation which he dates back to at least 1832. He expresses his very mixed feelings towards his brother, though says they have got on better since John Henry Newman's
