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#### Introduction

The papers listed below were discovered in two pamphlet boxes in the periodicals bookstack of the University of London Library in January 1982. There is no documentation to affirm positively the provenance of these records. Nonetheless, it is highly likely that most of the documents were at one time part of the office papers of Robert Lavies Roberts during his tenure of the post of Decretary of the London Society for the Extension of University Teaching (LSEUT) from 1885-1894. Subsequently R.D.Roberts served as Extension Registrar in the re-constituted University of London from 1902-1911. However, it is possible that the papers in section 6 (items 82a-110) and section 7 (items 111-116) are foreign to the rest of the papers in this collection and in fact were part of the working papers of F.V. Dickins, who is not known to have been directly connected with the LSEUT. See below pp.5-6

The LSEUT was an organisation formed in 1876 in order to spread the benefits of university education more widely among the population. Modelled upon the example of the Cambridge University Extension scheme, it ran lecture courses and set examinations. It was governed by a Council of 22 members including a President, which was advised, particularly in the choise of lecturers, by a joint Universities Board composed of representatives nominated by the governing bodies of the Universities of London, Oxford and Cambridge. The lectures were organised on a local level by Centres run by committee. The papers contained in this collection deal with matters of policy and central activities administered by the Secretary and the Council: finance, the printing of university extension publications and the campaign for the university extension movement in London to be included in a teaching university for London. A much greater quantity of LEMUT records, including the reports of lecturers and examiners, the Report of the Council, syllabuses and examination papers are to be found in the archives of the Extra-Mural Department of the University of London, now part of the archives of the Central Offices of the University of London, housed in the University of London Library.

When found, the material in this collection was arranged in no particular order. Thus it has

been necessary to impose an artificial arrangement upon these documents according to broad administrative subject areas. The Council of the LSEUT administered its affairs by the use of special committees. For instance, a committee existed to regulate the printing and publication of the University Extension Journal, although it has not been possible to discover its precise title. All material relating to the printing of university extension publications has therefore been grouped together.

The papers have been arranged in sections to cover broadly seven topics. First, the activities of the President of the LSEUT (G.J.Goschen) to raise money for extension work from the City of london livery companies. However in practice, as the surviving correspondence shows, much of the work was done on Goschen's behalf by H. Babington Smith, his private secretary. This section includes letters to The Times, a memorial to the Royal Commission on the City Livery Companies, correspondence, and lists of the donations made by individual livery companies.

The second section deals with the printing of university extension publications, in the main the University Extension Journal. The material comprises reports to the Council dealing with feasibility studies into the content, editorial control and financial arrangements of the journal. There are also tenders for printing university extension publications, contracts for printing the journal and other publications and for selling advertising space in the journal. In addition there is a set of accounts.

In the third section are listed a few leaflets which advertise the purpose and methods of the extension societies in London, Cambridge and Oxford.

The fourth section deals with the correspondence of the Council or the Secretary. One should note that correspondence relating to the appeals for funds, the University Extension Journal and other publications, and correspondence received by F.V.Dickins is listed in separate sections. The correspondence in section 4 comprises mainly communications concerning the campaign to bring about the inclusion of the university extension movement in London into a re-constituted University of London or a separate 'Albert' University.

Section 5 comprises the material relating to the campaign for the work of the LSEUT to be included in some form of teaching university for London. This campaign was part of a much wider public debate over the proper organisation for carrying out university teaching within the metropolis. 2 Until 1901 the University

of London was primarily an examining body; it was not responsible for the teaching of the students who sat for its examinations. The campaign to change the University of London into a teaching university began c.1884, largely through the formation of the Association for Promoting a Teaching University for London. The main protaganists in the ensuing debate were the Senate of the University of London, Convocation, the Royal College of Surgeons of England, the Royal College of Physicians of London, University College and King's College, in addition to the Association for Promoting a Teaching University. The LSEUT took advantage of the public debate to further its aim of improving the financial support and academic standing of extra-mural teaching in London by campaigning for the incorporation of the LSEUT as a department of a teaching university. Ultimately, the LSEUT was successful in this aim; 1902 the LSEUT was re-constituted as the Board to Promote the Extension of University Teaching of the University of London. Several of the Council members, for example Sir George Young of University College and Henry Wace of King's College, were prominent protagonists in the debate, representing the points of view of their colleges. This is reflected in some of the correspondence in section 5. The papers in this section comprise material produced by the Council to further its campaign: reports to the Council, memoranda, papers relating to the submission of evidence to the two Royal Commissions (Selborne's in 1888 and Gresham in 1892) set up to investigate the problem of higher education in London, and petitions to Parliament. There are several drafts of petitions in different stages of development and often the memoranda are annotated.

It is difficult to determine the status of the documents in section 6. The material includes contributions (mainly printed) to the debate over higher education in London by organisations or individuals other than the LSEUT. Several of these papers are annotated with comments about the merits of the arguments deployed in them. It is possible that a proportion of these documents had been collected by the LCEUT in order to plan better its own strategy. However, papers in at least one file, item 83 (i-viii), were addressed by hand to F.V. Dickins, who is not known to have been directly connected with the LSEUT. Moreover, Silvanus Thompson, writing in a letter to Dickins on 5 January 1896 (item 114), refers to a paper that Thompson presented to the Society of Arts which was reprinted in the Journal of the Society of Arts 17 January 1896. In addition, another of Dickins's correspondents, M. Crackanthorpe (see items 111, 112) is recorded as having contributed to the

discussion after the paper had been read at the Society of Arts. Thus, there is a connection between the correspondence of F.V.Dickins in section 7 (for which there is no direct connection with the LSEUT) and at least one item, LSEUT/83 (i-viii) in section 6. Possibly at least some of the material in section 6 was introduced into the pamphlet boxes at some point during the time they were stored in the bookstack of the University of London Library and thus do not form an organic part of the rest of these papers.

The items in section 7 (whose connection with items in section 6 have been discussed above), comprise six letters to F. Victor Dickins who was Assistant Registrar of the University of London during the period when they were written. They are a mixture of private and public business, but mainly connected with the re-constitution of the University of London.

Finally, there is a section of miscellaneous or unidentified material.
