-Booklets of by-laws and rules by societies which reflect Foxwell's personal interests and hobbies, such as: Amateur Dramatic Club (ADC) of Cambridge University, Association of British Members of the Swiss Alpine Club, Cambridge Alpine Club, Royston Golf Club

-Photographs:

(i) Three aerial shots of colleges at Cambridge, one of which is probably Foxwell's college St. Johns.

(ii) One studio shot of a baby, presumably a relative of Foxwell's. The cover to the photograph bears the inscription: 'To Grandpa with best love from Hugh'

(iii) Two head and shoulders studio shots of a man in an envelope bearing the inscription 'Photograph of Ernest. Excellent. Taken at Weymouth'. The photographs might therefore be of Foxwell's assistant Ernest W. Lockhart.

(iv) One head and shoulder studio shot of a young woman, presumably a relative of Foxwell's.

-Receipts etc. relating to Foxwell's personal financial affairs, such as receipts relating to the payment of college fees of Miss. D.M.H. Foxwell during her residence at Girton College at Cambridge, an invoice for the school fees of Miss M. Foxwell issued by Wycombe Abbey School.
